

Funding Gap Between Butler County School District and Wealthiest Districts Is Now Worse than Level **Declared Unconstitutional**

Passage of the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) in 1990 and accompanying tax increases drastically reduced the funding gap between Kentucky school districts. But years of austere budgets since have eroded funding for education, returning us to pre-KERA inequality.






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The state's failure to adequately fund education forces districts to try to make up the cost. Low property wealth makes it difficult for the Butler County School District and others to fill that gap. State disinvestment hurts these districts most.

The State Now Contributes a Smaller Share of **Education Funding Than School Districts**
